ûAB 561	Burke (D-Inglewood)	Rehabilitation programs & statewide evaluation –would make declarations and findings on the rehabilitation programs within the prison system.	2-year bill
ûAB 562	Burke (D-Inglewood)	Prisons: rehabilitation programs —this bill would require the CDCR to improve performance measures for in-prison rehabilitation programs and offer a cognitive behavioral therapy program at every state prison, and to require inmates identified as having a high risk of recidivism and high need for rehabilitation services to participate in a cognitive behavioral therapy program before being released from prison.	2-year bill
û AB 732	Bonta (D-Alameda)	County jails & Prisons: incarcerated pregnant persons – would require incarcerated pregnant persons to be scheduled for prenatal care visits.	2-year bill
ûAB 965	Stone (D-Scotts Valley)	Youth offender hearings: credits – applies credits earned by a youth offender while in custody of CDCR to reduce specified time limitations related to eligibility for youth offender parole	Senate Approps
ûAB 972	Bonta (D-Alameda)	Proposition 47: resentencing — would require the Department of Justice to notify the district attorney and the court of all cases that are potentially eligible for resentencing.	Dead
ûAB 1354	Gipson (D-Carson)	Juvenile court school pupils: joint transition planning policy: individualized transition plan – this bill requires county offices of education (COEs) to ensure that a student enrolled in a juvenile court school for more than 20 school days has an individualized transition plan and access to specified educational records upon release. 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ûAB 1446	Eggman (D-Stockton)	Inmates: driver's license – would require CDCR and the DMV to ensure that all eligible inmates have the opportunity to apply to obtain a driver's license upon release from state prison.	2-year bill
ûACA 12	Levine (D-Marin)	Death penalty — would amend the state constitution to delete the 1972 provision (requiring, authorizing, imposing or relating to the death penalty are in full force and effect, subject to legislative amendment or repeal by statute, initiative or referendum), and prohibit the death penalty from being imposed as a punishment for any violation of law. ûSB 42	Skinner (D-Berkeley)	Getting Home Safe Act –This bill requires each county sheriff to develop release standards in accordance with the provisions of this bill that will provide the safe release of a person from custody.	Asembly Approps
ûSB 136	Wiener(D-San Francisco)	Sentencing – would delete the provision that requires an additional one-year term for each prior separate prison term or county jail felony term.	Assembly Approps
ûSB 164	McGuire (D-Healdsburg)	Infractions: community service would authorize a person who has been convicted of an infraction to elect to perform that community service in the county in which the infraction violation occurred, the county of the person's residence or in any other county that the person has substantial ties. ûSB 269	Bradford (D-Gardena)	Wrongful convictions –would make special provisions inapplicable to specified cases in which the Crime Victim Compensation Board is required to compensate a person for a wrongful conviction.	Assembly Approps
ûSB 284	Beall (D-San Jose)	Juvenile justice: county support of wards This bill requires a county from which a person is committed to DJJ to pay to the state the following rate for the time the person remains in an institution under the direct supervision of DJJ, or in an institution, boarding home, foster home, or other private or public institution in which the person is placed by DJJ, and cared for and supported at the expense of DJJ:	Assembly Floor

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ûSB 375	Durazo (D-Los Angeles)	Victims of crime: application for compensation – would allow a victim of crime to file an application for compensation at any time following the crime. Current law states three years from the date of the crime.	Assembly Approps
ûSB 555	Mitchell (D-Los Angeles)	Jails and juvenile facilities: telephone services: stores would reduce the heavy financial placed on families and support systems of incarcerated individuals by eliminating the exorbitant costs of communications, regulating prices for goods sold inside and requiring profits made from these services are reinvested to support people incarcerated.	Assembly Approps
û SB 678	Glazer (D-Orinda)	Restorative Justice Pilot Program – would require the BSCC to establish a Restorative Justice Pilot Program and make 5-year grants available for up to three counties to establish and operate restorative justice diversion programs.	Approps Suspense.
ûSB 716	Mitchell (D-Los Angeles)	Juveniles: postsecondary and career technical education – would require the county probation department in collaboration with CDCR and the DJJ that juveniles with a high school diploma or a CA high school equivalency certificate have access to a full array of postsecondary academic and career technical education programs.
